




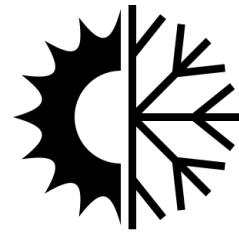


Prior knowledge



Who? (People)

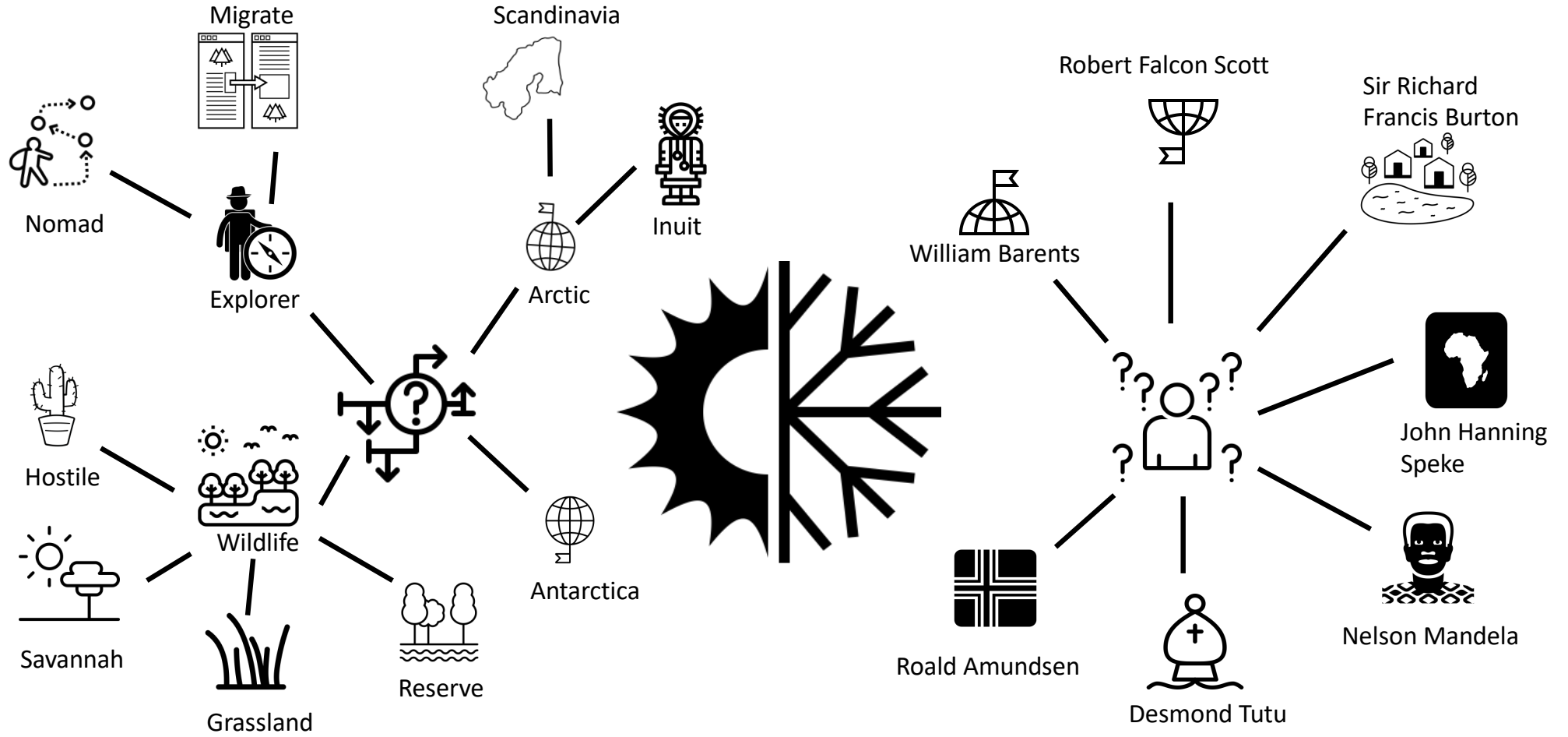
William Barents	A Dutch explorer of the Arctic region	
Robert Falcon Scott	Led an expedition to the South Pole	
Sir Richard Francis Burton	First European to discover Lake Tanganyika and to visit some Muslim cities	
John Hanning Speke	British Indian Army Officer who made three exploratory expeditions to Africa	
Nelson Mandela	A South African anti-apartheid activist and the first black President of South Africa	
Desmond Tutu	A South African social rights activist and the first Anglican bishop in Cape Town	
Roald Amundsen	A Norwegian explorer who beat Scott in the race to the South Pole	

What? (Key vocabulary)

Arctic	The Arctic is the area around the Earth's North Pole	
Antarctica	All the lands between the Antarctic Circle and the South Pole	
Scandinavia	A group of countries in northern Europe, that includes Norway and Sweden and sometimes Denmark	
explorer	A person who explores an area that is not known	
hostile	Hard to bear, harsh	
Inuit	Eskimo people of the arctic regions of North America	
wildlife	Wild animals that live free of humans	
nomad	tribe that has no fixed home and moves from place to place	
savannah	A flat plain covered with grass and few trees	
grassland	A large area of land covered by grass	
reserve	An area of public land set aside for a particular purpose	
migrate	To move from one region into another
