Can you work out if these are fake?

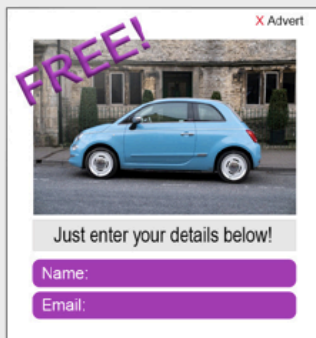


Can I Trust It?

There is a chat function on an online game and another player sends you this message.

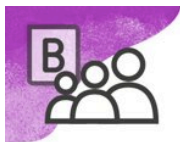
? Do you trust them?
